WHAT IS THE MEANING OF 'BRINGING IN THE LIGHT'?



What is the meaning of 'Bringing in the Light'? This was the question that the Love Sunday School Class brought to teacher Steve Jelinek. Acolytes, which means follower, a helper or assistant, have been part of the church in one form or another for nearly 2,000 years.

"Jesus said: 'I am the light of the world" (John 8:12). The light reminds us of Jesus coming into our world and into our lives. It is carried into the worship service as a symbol of Jesus coming into the presence of the worshiping community.

Lathrop UMC uses two candles on the altar to remind us that Jesus was both a human being and God. At the close of the service, the light is carried out into the world to symbolizes the light of Jesus Christ going out into the world where believers are to serve.

In the weeks and months to come the role of the Acolytes in our church will become more prominent in serving the Communion and in other ways.

And each year that passes You're even more glad, More grateful and proud just to call him your dad!


